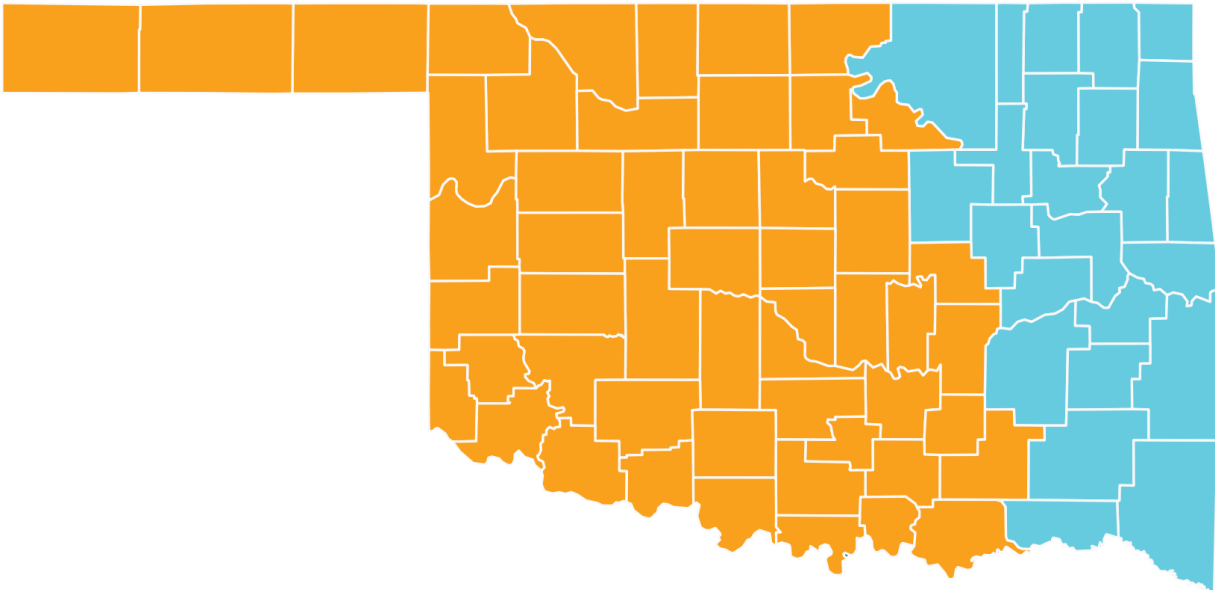

CACFP	Child and Adult Care Food Program	Oklahoma State Department of Education	Provides nutritious meals to children and elderly individuals in day-care and at-risk after school program settings.
CSFP	Commodity Supplemental Food Program	Oklahoma Department of Human Services	Provides commodity foods to low-income pregnant and breastfeeding women, new mothers up to one year postpartum, infants, children up to age 6, and elderly people at least 60 years of age. In Oklahoma, the focus is on the elderly.
FRAC	Food Research and Action Center	N/A	N/A
FRP	Free and Reduced Price	N/A	Refers to meals provided by National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program.
NSLP	National School Lunch Program	Oklahoma State Department of Education	Provides low-cost or free nutritious lunch to children in school.
SBP	School Breakfast Program	Oklahoma State Department of Education	Provides low-cost or free nutritious breakfast to children in school.
SNAP	Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program	Oklahoma Department of Human Services	Formerly known as the Food Stamp Program. Enables low-income families to purchase nutritious food.
TEFAP	The Emergency Food Assistance Program	Oklahoma Department of Human Services	Commodity foods are made available to states by the United States Department of Agriculture. State agencies provide the food to local organizations, usually food banks, which in turn, distribute the food to soup kitchens and food pantries that directly serve the public.
WIC	Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children	Oklahoma State Department of Health	Provides supplemental foods, health care referrals, and nutrition education to low-income pregnant and breastfeeding women, new mothers up to one year postpartum, and infants and children up to age 5 who are at nutritional risk.

### Talking Points

- Almost 17 percent of Oklahomans, or approximately 608,000 people, are living in poverty.
- 350,000 people in the Regional Food Bank's service area are living in poverty.
- 257,000 people in the Community Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma's service area are living in poverty.
- 23 percent of Oklahoma's children are living in poverty.
- One in five children in the Regional Food Bank's service area are living in poverty.
- Almost one quarter of children in the Community Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma's service area are living in poverty.
- More than 118,000 children in the Regional Food Bank's service area are living in poverty.
- More than 89,000 children in the Community Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma's service area are living in poverty.
- In Oklahoma, 27,000 people, or 3.1% of all hourly workers, earn at or below the federal minimum wage – and 66.7% of that group are women ([http://www.bls.gov/regions/southwest/news-release/minimumwageworkers\\_oklahoma.htm](http://www.bls.gov/regions/southwest/news-release/minimumwageworkers_oklahoma.htm)).
- Nearly half of working-aged Oklahomans in poverty (43.2 percent) worked full or part-time in 2015 (OK Policy Institute, 2015 Poverty Profile).
- Adjusted for inflation, the median income for Oklahoma households is lower today (\$46,879 in 2015) than it was in 2014 (\$46,235) (Bureau of Labor Statistics Inflation calculator).
- Although Oklahoma's unemployment rate ranks in the middle compared with other states (27<sup>th</sup>) at around 5 percent, we still struggle with issues of significant *underemployment*. When one considers the amount of Oklahomans who are underemployed due to an inability to find full-time work, this rate increases considerably to 8.8 percent (Bureau of Labor Statistics, Local Area Unemployment Statistics, Alternative Measures of Labor Utilization by State, Second Quarter of 2016 through first quarter of 2017).
- Oklahoma has significant issues with low-wage jobs. 30 percent, or nearly one-third of our jobs exist in occupations with median annual pay *below* the poverty line for a family of four. Oklahoma is 38<sup>th</sup> among the states in this category (Corporation for Enterprise Development, Assets and Opportunity Scorecard 2016: <http://scorecard.assetsandopportunity.org/latest/state/ok>).

### Talking Points

- According to Feeding America’s nationwide Map the Meal Gap study, 632,030 Oklahomans, or 16 percent struggle with hunger.
- According to Feeding America’s nationwide Map the Meal Gap study, almost 360,000 Oklahomans are food-insecure in the Regional Food Bank’s service area.
- According to Feeding America’s nationwide Map the Meal Gap study, nearly 250,000 Oklahomans are food-insecure in the Community Food Bank of Eastern Oklahoma’s service area.
- According to Feeding America’s nationwide Map the Meal Gap study, nearly one in four children in Oklahoma struggles with hunger.
- Oklahoma ranks near the worst among the states in terms of very low food security, at 10<sup>th</sup> (although ranking systems are discouraged) (USDA ERS, Prevalence of household-level food insecurity and very low food security, average 2013-2015).
- According to FRAC’s most recent report on Food Hardship across the U.S., Oklahoma ranks in 4<sup>th</sup> worst in the nation, with almost 20 percent of Oklahomans struggling to afford enough food last year.
- Tulsa ranks in the top 20 worst U.S. metropolitan areas for food hardship – with one in five residents reporting that they did not have enough money to buy needed food at some point during the past 12 Months (FRAC, How Hungry is America? 2016 report).

- More than 250,000 students in the Regional Food Bank's service area receive free or reduced cost school meals.
- More than 173,000 students in the Community Food Bank's service area receive free or reduced cost school meals.
- More than 84 percent of children attending Oklahoma City Public Schools receive free or reduced cost school meals (Oklahoma State Department of Education Low Income Report, 2016-2017. Actual figure is 84.41%).
- More than 80 percent of children attending Tulsa Public Schools receive free or reduced cost school meals (Oklahoma State Department of Education Low Income Report, 2016-2017. Actual figure is 80.02%).

- More than 1.4 million meals were served through the Summer Food Service Program last year.
- Oklahoma ranks 51<sup>st</sup> in the nation for the percentage of eligible students receiving summer meals (FRAC, Hunger Doesn't Take a Vacation: Summer Nutrition Status Report, June 2017).
- More than 110,000 Oklahomans received WIC in FY2016.
- The average WIC monthly benefit per person is \$36.
- Half of all infants born in Oklahoma are enrolled in WIC (Oklahoma State Department of Health, 2017).
- More than 55,000 people were served on average each day through the Child and Adult Care Food Program.
- More than 38 million meals were served through the Child and Adult Care Food Program last year.

**Talking Points**

- Almost 875,000 Oklahomans received SNAP last year.
- Approximately 14% of households in Oklahoma receive SNAP.
- The average SNAP benefit amount per person in Oklahoma is \$119 per month, which equates to just \$3.97 per day.
- Of the more than 200,000 Oklahoma households receiving SNAP, 55% contain a child under the age of 18, and one quarter contain someone age 60 or older.
- More than 110,000 households who received SNAP in FY2015 had someone under the age of 18.
- Almost 50,000 households who received SNAP in FY2015 had at least one person age 60 or older.
- More than 73% of all Oklahoma SNAP participants are in families with children (Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, March 2017: [http://www.cbpp.org/sites/default/files/atoms/files/snap\\_factsheet\\_oklahoma.pdf](http://www.cbpp.org/sites/default/files/atoms/files/snap_factsheet_oklahoma.pdf)).
- More than 30% of all Oklahoma SNAP participants are in families with members who are elderly or have disabilities (Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, March 2017).
- Almost 43% of all Oklahoma SNAP participants are in working families (Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, March 2017).
